# **CLASS POLICIES & PROCEDURES:**

**Classroom Behavior:** This class is designed to allow us to work together and it is our responsibility to behave appropriately. Our actions have consequences and may cause others to not receive the full benefit of a lesson or put someone in harm's way. Think of this room as an extension of your home where respect and kindness should be the norm. We must also be willing to look out for the person next to us to ensure that they are learning and safe.



# **Required Materials:**

## **Rules & Expectations:**

## Non Negotiables

- 1. Students must enter classroom with all supplies (pencil, academic portfolio, agenda). Students who do not come to class prepared will face the following consequences:
  - Automatic detention and phone call home that day
  - Lose participation points
  - Students must enter on time and be on task when bell sounds. Students are expected to enter quietly and complete the focus activity silently. Students who do not enter on time will be required to sign the tardy log, and will also be marked late in the Infinite Campus attendance system, as per district requirements. Students who are tardy to class are breaking the student code of conduct, and will face the appropriate consequence.
- 2. Students must be actively engaged in class 100% of the time (this means student has their head up and is on task). Students not in compliance with this policy will face the following sequence of consequences:
  - Verbal warning, loss of participation points
  - Written warning, phone call home
  - Assignment to Academic Intervention Center if work is not completed, phone call home

We have high expectations for all 9<sup>th</sup> grade students, and have a lot to accomplish this school year! To ensure we are all engaging in a cooperative work environment, students will be held to the following expectations:

**P** ay attention, participate, and keep your head up and off your desk

**E** xpect the best of yourself every day (We Will!)

C are for your personal needs outside of the class.

Passes out of the class will be given for emergencies only!

T ake pride in your work, turn in Quality work on time.



# **Student Code of Conduct:**

- Students must be in compliance with the student dress code.
- **NO cell phones or other electronic devices** (such as mp3 players, pagers, electronic games, etc.) These items are prohibited during school hours. This includes (but is not limited to) sending/receiving "text messages." The power button must be in the "off" position during school *hours*. All students found in violation will be subject to the following consequences:
  - First Offense Confiscation of the device for 10 days, at which time the device will be returned to a parent or guardian
  - **Second Offense** Confiscation of device for the semester, at which time the device will be returned to a parent or guardian on the last day of the current semester.
- Students may only go to their lockers during the designated locker times. This includes before 1<sup>st</sup> period, before lunch, after lunch, and after 4<sup>th</sup> period.
- Students must use the restroom during "passing time" between classes. Passes during class will only be issued for EMERGENCIES ONLY.
- The "20/20 Rule" Students may not leave the classroom during the first and last 20 minutes of • class.
- Students must adhere to proper behavior when traveling outside the classroom. .

#### **Consequences**

If any of the classroom expectations are not adhered to, the following consequences will be followed:

First offense- Verbal Warning Second offense- Written Warning & Parent Phone Call Third offense- Detention & Parent Phone Call **Fourth offense-** Referral – (Suspension, Parent Conference)

## **Detention Policy**

- Students may receive **detention** for not adhering to any of the rules and expectations outlined ٠ above and in the student code of conduct.
- Detention is assigned verbally and written on the "detention door". ٠
- It is the student's responsibility to be aware of assigned detention sessions and report on time at ٠ 3:45.
- If a student does not show up for an assigned detention, a referral will result followed by ٠ suspension.
- If a student accumulates more than 2 detentions in one week, an automatic **referral** will follow ( • Suspension, Parent Conference).

## **Attendance Policy:**

Students are expected to be in class on time, every day. Any day that a student is absent, he/she is expected to complete the class work and homework that was assigned on that day. It is the student's *responsibility* to obtain all missed assignments! All make-up work must be completed within a week of the absence.



## Late Work:

It is important that students learn to honor and meet due dates and deadlines for class assignments. Students must adhere to due dates and deadlines published in the syllabus or otherwise assigned by the teacher. If a student misses a published due date as a result of an unexcused absence, his or her grade for that assignment can be reduced at the teacher's discretion. A student who misses a due date that was previously assigned because of an approved excused absence must submit the assignment the next time he or she reports to class. Teachers cannot refuse to accept students' work that is late because of an excused absences.

## Daily Assignments & Make Up

Work assigned is for your benefit. Completing that work during class or at home will ensure that your mastery of the content. Your work will be evaluated either through questioning or peer review. Part of your assignment grade will come from reading scientifically related articles and providing me with an abstract of what you read and how it helped your learning in the class. Working hard is not just about getting a grade.

Students who fail to turn in daily assignments due to unexcused absences are not entitled to make up the work for credit. This includes class cuts. Students who miss daily assignments due to excused absences are allowed to make up the work <u>within three class periods upon his or her return to school.</u> Arrangements for making up tests, class work, and other assignments after absences are the responsibility of the student.

## **Science Fair Project**

All students enrolled in a science course at Mays High are required to complete a science fair project. This project must be completed prior to the Christmas break. The competition for the school will occur in January. You are required to submit your topic by the 1<sup>st</sup> Tuesday in September. ## **ACADEMIC HONESTY**
